

THIS MONTH:

School lets out this month and all over the Bay Area kids will be searching for things to do. Many high school students are looking for summer jobs but won't be able to find them. Many children of poor and Third World parents will be unable to participate in summer programs due to inadequate facilities, limited enrollment, or high cost. Many children of working parents will spend summer on their own because public programs or childcare are not available for the full working day. On the back side of the calendar, we list some of the programs we know about in the East Bay that are easily accessible and free or low cost. There are events and activities especially for children listed on the front, too. (See June 5 for information on La Peña's free tardesada for children.) Happy summer in the city!

One year ago on June 11, Barlow Benavidez, a 28-year-old unarmed Chicano youth, was murdered by Oakland police officer Michael Cogley. Barlow was stopped in the Fruitvale area on suspicion of a crime and ordered into a search position against his car. A shotgun was placed against his head and fired. Barlow was dead. The incident was declared an accident by the Oakland Police Department, and the local grand jury, and there was never any disciplinary action taken.

This year on June 11, in memory of Barlow, there will be a benefit cultural program (see June 11). Culminating a year of community organizing against the racism and police repression that led to Barlow's death, the Barlow Benavidez Committee Against Police Crimes, along with numerous other organizations, will hold a press conference on June 9 to call for a Federal investigation of Barlow's murder. To help in this campaign, the committee is asking all concerned people to send Mailgrams via Western Union to the U.S. Attorney General's office to demand that Cogley be prosecuted and that police be held accountable for crimes against the community (see June 11 for information on how you can participate in this campaign).

A March & Rally for Human Rights will be held June 14 in San Francisco. The march will pass the South African, Chilean, and Philippine Consulates to focus on U.S. aid to repressive dictatorships and violations of human rights in the Third World. The action is sponsored by a broad coalition of groups, the Bay Area Human Rights Working Committee (see June 11).

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## SUMMER IN THE CITY

June's community calendar highlights some of the opportunities—and problems—facing youth in the East Bay. Summer is eagerly awaited by most children as a vacation from the oppressive experience of school.

Kids hate school for different reasons. It is highly competitive and individualistic; it instills values that divide kids as to their sex, race or talents, in preparation for their later "place" in life. Success is at the expense of others. Mostly it is boring—a slow but sure introduction to the workaday world of the factory or the home. High schools operate as huge "tracking" systems, channeling students into different courses of study—and eventually jobs—depending largely on their race and class. Often schools don't teach at all; rather, they concentrate on policing and controlling students who rebel.

It is no wonder that kids look forward to getting out into the "real world." But it is also true that when out of school for the summer or for good, kids find themselves in for even greater difficulties.

### Unemployment

Youth account for one-half of all people unemployed. The unemployment rate for Black teenagers is about 40%. Rarely does private enterprise take any initiative in hiring or training youth except as an opportunity to obtain cheap, temporary, unorganized labor. This leaves only government-sponsored job programs for youth, and they are very limited. Investigation for the *Community Calendar* revealed no readily accessible programs that were not long since filled.

### Daycare

Many children of working parents will spend summer on their own because public daycare programs are not available for the full working day. Most programs are once a week for a few years, and they often require transportation in the middle of the day. The school districts leave buildings empty during the summer instead of working out a joint program with the Parks and Recreation Department to provide free care for children between the hours of 8 am and 6 pm. After-school programs are available, but always filled long in advance. Teachers of after-school programs are generally credentialled academic teachers fighting to maintain their benefits—a short workday and summer vacation. Parents and teachers must combine their efforts to gain city programs which will employ more teachers and provide day-long care to the majority of children.

### Summer School

There will be free summer school programs in both Oakland and Berkeley. For example, at Berkeley High there will be an **Afro-American Study Summer School** for children from kindergarten to sixth grade and one for seventh to twelfth graders; 8:30 to noon at Berkeley High, free busing, call 644-6759.

The basic idea is a participatory extravaganza: all the children of a neighborhood will have a chance to learn puppetry, mask making, mime, acrobatics, clowning, juggling, music, tightrope, dance, costuming, and make-up through workshops in their community. **Oakland Parks and Recreation Department** has several programs beyond maintaining their pools and recreation centers. For locations of pools, parks and centers look in the phone book under Oakland, City of, Parks and Recreation Department. Following are some of the programs. . . .

You'll need to pick up an entry blank at your local recreation center. There will be a full range of track and field events and five age divisions.

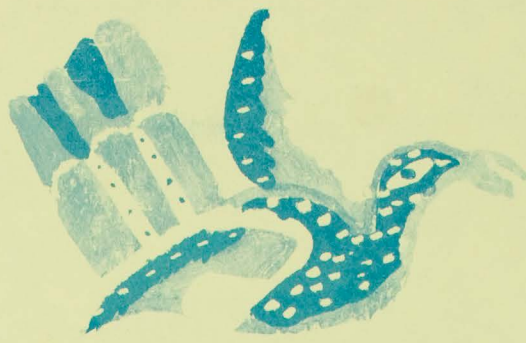

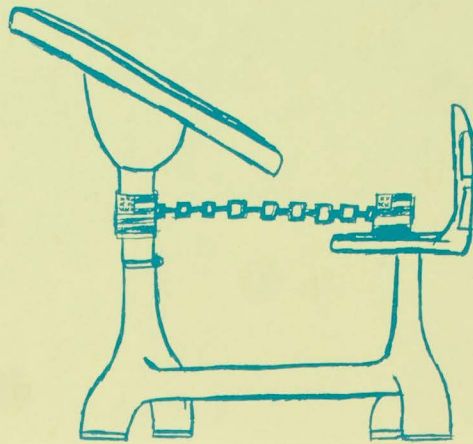

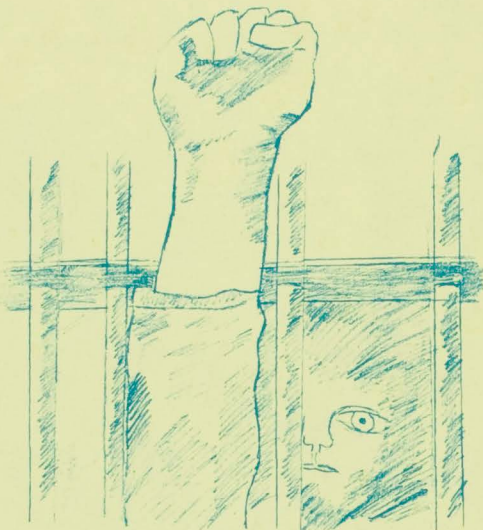
